


A QR code containing the sample audio recordings and the video is available on the back cover of the student book. Students can scan the code with their smart phones or tablets and enjoy the materials.





Also available is the cuttingedge AR (Augmented Reality) app. When the students use their mobile devices to scan the target images on their book, conversation videos and audios will pop up and play.


